

THE CONSTITUTION OF  
THE STATE OF BRUNEI, 1959  
THE EMERGENCY ORDERS, 1962

In exercise of the powers conferred upon him by subsection (3) of section 83 of the Constitution of the State of Brunei, 1959, His Highness the Sultan hereby makes the following Orders :—

1. These Orders may be cited as the Emergency Short title.  
(Control of Radiocommunication) Orders, 1967.
2. In these Orders unless the context otherwise Interpretation.  
requires —
  - “Hertzian waves” means electromagnetic waves between 10 Kc/s and 3,000,000 Mc/s;
  - “License” means a license issued by the Controller of Telecommunications;
  - “Local vessel” means any ship registered in a port of the State, or any vessel licensed to be used in the tidal waters of the State, or any unlicensed vessel habitually kept in the State or the territorial waters thereof;
  - “radiocommunication” means any telecommunication by means of Hertzian waves;
  - “radiocommunication apparatus” means any apparatus or any component part thereof capable of being used or being adapted for the transmission of Hertzian waves;
  - “radiocommunication station” means a separate transmitter or a combination of transmitter and receiver including the accessory equipment required for carrying on a definite radiocommunication service;
  - “vehicle” means any vehicle whether mechanically propelled or not.

3. No persons shall —

- (a) import, establish or possess any radio-communication station or instal or work any radiocommunication apparatus in any place in the State or on board any local vessel or local aircraft or in any vehicle; or offer for sale or sell any radio-communication station or apparatus except under and in accordance with a license issued under these Orders.
- (b) Any person who imports, establishes or is in possession of any radiocommunication station or instals or works any radiocommunications apparatus, or offers for sale, or sells any radiocommunications station or apparatus without a license shall be guilty of an offence and shall be liable to a fine not exceeding three thousand dollars or to imprisonment for a term not exceeding three years or to both such fine and imprisonment.

4. Nothing in these Orders shall apply to officers and men of His Highness's Armed Forces or Her Majesty's Armed Forces, the Police, or other Local Force established under any written law in force in the State using radiocommunication stations or apparatus in the performance of their official duties, nor to any Government officer authorised generally or specifically in that behalf by the Controller of Telecommunications.

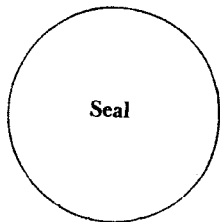
5. Any person found with or displaying any radiocommunication station or radiocommunication apparatus shall be deemed for the purpose of these Orders to be in possession of such station or apparatus.

- 6. (a) If a Police Officer of or above the rank of Inspector has reasonable grounds for believing that a radiocommunication station or apparatus has been imported, or established, or installed, or worked, or sold, or is possessed, or is offered for sale,

by any person without a license not being a person exempted or authorised under Order 4 of these Orders in any place in the State or on board any local vessel or local aircraft, he may enter and search any place, local vessel or local aircraft, and seize any such station or apparatus which appears to him to be used or intended to be used for radio-communication.

- (b) A Police Officer may seize any radio-communication station or apparatus which is found by him in any vehicle and which appears to him to be used or intended to be used for radiocommunication therein by any person without a license not being a person exempted or authorised under Order 4 of these Orders.
